Our graduates were employed at a variety of different worksites, visited day programs, and held in-house positions here at The Phoenix Center, where they prepared mailings, stocked vending machines, and practiced their purchasing skills. They have worked at employment sites like Anthony's Coal Fired Pizza, TJ Maxx, Tempo Music, Options, Walgreens, Goodwill Industries, William Paterson University, and Vreeland Associates.

A very noteworthy addition this year is that we launched a Graduate Support Services Program for our graduates and their families. Once a month, our Transition Coordinator, Laureen Protomastro will contact our graduates and their families to check-in and see how things are going since graduating from The Phoenix Center. It is our hope that this service will help ensure that our graduates are maximizing the post-21 services available to them. This program is another example of the love and respect we have for our students and their families. Through this new initiative, we are able to stay in touch and help when needed.
